


Here are some of the highlights of our year

This is Katniss one of our special needs cats who needed a lot of care to bring her back to health.




We admitted Twiggy, she was running in the woods like a wild dog, she's actually very sweet and submissive now and hopefully will find a home soon.





Michelle & Tyler here with Coco who joined their family.





> Bailey with Molly, both very adoptable, Molly found a great home with Ann Clifford and Bailey is going to be available next year.






















Jane Fishel adopted Mango who had been at the shelter for many years, she joined Jane's Dachsund and they all get along famously!
